

Wilfred B. Brammall

Wilfred B. Brammall, 61, of 108 Rand St., Central Falls, until recently janitor of the Broad Street School, that city, died yesterday at the U.S. Veterans' Hospital, Providence. He was a veteran of World War I, having served with the 82nd Division, U.S. Army.

Mr. Brammall was born in England, Dec. 14, 1895, son of the late James and Sarah (Hamilton) Brammall and had lived in Central Falls 34 years. Before his appointment as a school janitor he was employed at the U.S. Naval Torpedo Station, Newport, for 13 years.

He was a communicant of Holy Trinity Church of Central Falls and a member of the Holy Name Society of that church. He was also a member of Maj. Walter G. Gatchell Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars, of Pawtucket.

Besides his wife, Mary (Cleary) Brammall, he is survived by a son, William F. Brammall of Central Falls; a sister, Mrs. Jennie Jacques of Pawtucket; a brother, William, of Pawtucket and three grandchildren.

The funeral will be held Wednesday at 9 a.m. from the P. J. McArdle Funeral Home, 21 Knight St., Central Falls, with a solemn requiem Mass at 9.45 a.m. at Holy Trinity Church. Burial will be in Mount Calvary Cemetery.
