

RECORD OF 220 MEN FOR NAVY SET BY LANSING

Leading all other cities of the state Lansing sets another patriotic record in her naval recruiting activities, pushing her volunteer quota to 220 men. Just at present calls for aviation gunners are attracting the attention of the capital city's young men and served as a stimulus for the record made in the past two days when 33 names were added to the jackie list. "Our campaign is just reaching its climax," said R. Guy Brownson head of the local recruiting station.
